The Little Flowers Green Scene - Small steps to take in the New Year **Plastic bags versus Reusable Bags**

The National Environmental Agency states the following facts about plastic bags:

- About 2.5 billion plastic shopping bags are used every year. That's about 2,500 bags used per family per year.
- Plastic bags thrown away as litter, dirty our public places, rivers and canals, and may even clog up drains, and this would lead to stagnant water and mosquito breeding.
- Plastic bags litter despoils nature trails, beaches and even chokes up mangroves and poses a threat to marine lives.

- Plastic bags are made from oil, a finite resource. By using reusable bags during our shopping trips, we will use fewer plastic bags and help to conserve earth's resources.

We really need to cut down the amount of waste that is generated. As a school, we are trying to become more "green" everyday. Everyday at our school, we use many plastic bags for wet and/or soiled clothing.

We would like to encourage all families, especially those with toddlers and younger children who may still have accidents on a regular basis, to purchase some waterproof/washable /reusable bags for wet clothes. One easy way is to have these bags for clothes when they become wet.

In the future when new families begin our program, we are going to be asking them to purchase these bags.

Creating a Valentine for your Child

We would like all of the parents (Toddlers and Children's House) to create a Valentine for your child (separate ones for siblings). Use poems, pictures, stickers, colored paper, etc... Be creative. Use your imagination. The restrictions are that it must not be larger than 8.5" x 11" and it must be light enough to hang on the wall with blue painter's tape.

Shhhhh! Keep it a secret, if you can. The children will be so surprised excited by when they receive their Valentine. The children absolutely loved this last year.

Please bring in your valentine on Mon., Feb. 9 in a bag. Each casa will hold gatherings to present the children with their valentine. The valentines will be hung up around the school for all to enjoy.

For the Casas: A Valentine for a Friend

Each child will draw one name from a basket of names only from his/her casa. Each child will then create one valentine only for that friend. Let your child be creative and imaginative. Ask the children about their friends, what their favorite foods are, what their hobbies are, maybe they love dinosaurs or princesses. All of these ideas would make a great theme. Your child probably knows more than you think about his/her friend. This might take longer than a day. Have different art mediums and materials available for your child.

It will be a big surprise at the Valentine's Day party when each child will give the valentine to the friend he/she created it for.

A Montessori Minute

Why do we teach cursive first?

- Cursive writing is a more natural way of writing. The pencil flows along the paper without frequent stops within words.
- There is less confusion and reversal between the cursive forms of the letters 'b', 'd', 'p', and 'q' as there is in the print form.
- Words written in cursive are clearly separated from each other. Run-on words are not as common in cursive.
- The child who can read cursive can also read manuscript, but the reverse is not true.
- Cursive is a better exercise for strengthening fine motor skills. The connecting letters help the child to produce smooth, rather than choppy, strokes with the pencil.
